The 1918 (wrongly called) Spanish flu epidemic was caused by an influenza A (H1N1) virus, <a href="https://commons.">https://commons.</a> killing more than 500,000 people in the United States, and up to 50 million worldwide. wikimedia.org/wiki/ The possible source was a newly emerged virus from a swine or an avian host of a mutated File: Reconstructed\_Spanish\_ H1N1 virus. Many people died within the first few days after infection, and others died Flu\_Virus.jpg of complications later. Nearly half of those who died were young, healthy adults. Influenza A (H1N1) viruses still circulate today after being introduced again into the human population in the 1970s.
